THE BURDEN OF ISIS

INTRODUCTION

OF all the Egyptian religious beliefs that existed from the Prehistoric period down into Roman times, the oldest and the one most held in veneration was that connected with the worship of Osiris, Isis and Horus. These three, though primarily only local gods, at an early period became prominent deities of all Egypt; and the cult of Isis, more particularly, remained a favourite always, rivalling even that of Osiris in later times.

During the many thousand years of Egyptian history, not only did many changes occur in the ceremonies connected with these cults, but also the legends and origin of the Osirian faith received many additions and interpolations; and thus the old faith lost much of its purity. The simplest form in which it is preserved to us states that Osiris was the son of Seb and Nut—*i.e.* Earth and Heaven; of whom were

born also Isis, Nephthys and Set, or Sutekh, as he is also called.

Osiris married his sister Isis, while Set chose Nephthys. It is probably due to this feature of the legend that the Pharaohs often married their sisters, and occasionally also their daughters. Osiris was the first divine ruler of Egypt : whence he came is not told ; but when he came to that country, he found it sunk in barbarism and ignorance, with no law but that of strength, and poverty everywhere. He went through the land settling quarrels, organizing government, teaching polite manners and customs, dictating laws and civilizing the people.

Set, his brother, became jealous of the renown of Osiris, and hated him because of the good he had done ; and resolved upon his destruction. Assisted by the evil spirits, or demons (the "enemies" or "foes" of the chants), Set constructed a large chest exactly the size and shape of the body of his brother Osiris ; and at a feast given by the latter, he offered to present the chest, which was richly adorned, to the one whose body it best fitted. No one was successful until Osiris entered the chest, when Set closed it, and with the help of the evil spirits bore it from the banquet hall and cast it into the Nile. Thereupon Isis fled to the Delta, taking with her Horus, her son, whom she left to be cared for in Buto, according to some

legends ; others say he was left with Tehuti, or Thoth, god of learning. Isis then took a boat and searched the Nile for the body of her husband, which she ultimately found in the Delta. Before it could be interred, however, it was stolen by Set, who then divided the body into fourteen portions, and scattered them over the whole of Egypt. Again the bereaved Isis commenced a search for the pieces of her husband's body, and found thirteen ; the fourteenth piece, the phallus, she was unable to find, it having been eaten by fish.

Wherever a fragment of the body of Osiris was found, a temple was there erected to his memory ; and as the head (or according to some authorities, the heart) was found at Abydos, that city was considered as especially sacred, and was the centre of his worship.

Horus, son of Osiris and Isis, avenged his father's death by ultimately slaying Set ; while Osiris, miraculously resurrected by Horus in the regions of the dead, ruled over the underworld and its inhabitants. Such, briefly, is the legend of Osiris. But the cult could never have become national in character without changing in many ways. Every city and town of any prominence in Egypt had its own especial local deity, who received special worship, even while other deities were admitted to exist, though considered subordinate to him : and at an

early date the priesthood of Osiris began systematically to identify the leading characteristics of these various local gods with those of Osiris. Hence in course of time we find Osiris-Sokar, an identification of the local god Sokar with the great deity of Abydos ; Osiris-Apis, which in Greek times became Serapis, where the attributes of Osiris had become identified with those of a Memphite deity ; and in later times, Osiris became a solar deity, and is addressed by epithets and titles which seem to show an identification with Ra, the sun god. By this means, Abydos became the great early religious centre of Egypt. But these identifications of various deities were not confined to Osiris. Horus became mutated, and gained new attributes—as Horus-Ra, he became the midday sun ; and under the priesthood of Heliopolis, he became Tum, the setting sun, even losing his name. Isis, also, received new qualifications, being often identified with Hathor (whom the Greeks in turn identified with Aphrodite) ; but the chief places where Hathor was worshipped were at Denderah and at Der-el-Bahri, in the western portion of Thebes ; while the worship of Isis centred around Abydos and Busiris, the latter being frequently mentioned in the liturgies ; and in later times also she was worshipped at Philae ; and her worship was so popular, that long after Egypt had ceased to be a nation, and her gods had become a by-word,

there were no less than three great temples erected to her cult within the walls of Rome itself.

It is this merging of the attributes of one god into those of another, and their unification into Osiris, to which the chants refer when speaking of the "attributes" of the deities. The eating of the fourteenth fragment of the body of Osiris by fish is paralleled by a similar legend in the story of "Anpu and Bata," often called the "Tale of the Two Brothers."

The triad was not an unusual combination in the Egyptian belief; for besides that of Osiris, Isis and Horus, we find Amen, Mut and Khonsu at Thebes; and other lesser triads; so that when Christianity reached Egypt, the trinitarian idea found ready adherents; and this may partly account for the strides which Christianity made in Egypt almost before it had obtained a foothold elsewhere. The resurrection of Osiris and his ruling over the spirits of the deceased is nearly a parallel to the story of the Cretan King Minos, and possesses some points in common with the Christian belief; while the worship of Isis paved the way for the worship of the Virgin Mary many centuries later, though this latter was repudiated by the Egyptian Christians of the first four centuries, probably as being too reminiscent of "paganism." (Budge, "Paradise of the Fathers," I., II.)

The position of Set is curious. While he was

considered an evil deity, yet he had many temples and worshippers; in early times, strangely enough, in addition to the "Horus" name, some Pharaohs had a "Set" name; and the name of Set was used by several later Pharaohs, such as Sety I., Sety Merenptah, Set-aa-pehti, Set-Nekht and others.

Nephthys plays a somewhat unimportant rôle in the liturgies, as well as in the Egyptian pantheon, being usually associated with Isis. She seems to have repudiated Set after the murder of Osiris, and to have aided Isis in seeking for the body.

The continuity of the chants is much broken; it appears as if two, or even three, deities are addressed at the same moment. This, however, is due to two causes: first, the identification of attributes originally belonging to divers deities in the person of the one god Osiris; and second, to the fact that these chants were accompanied by spectacular performances—a forerunner of the "miracle-plays" of the Elizabethan period. Various temple officials impersonated the gods on certain occasions, and these were implored, invoked or praised as the living representative of the deity. But more frequently the animal sacred to the god was brought out and worshipped—not for himself, but for the deity he represented. The Hawk of Horus at Edfu, the Crocodile of Sebek at Crocodilopolis, the Cow

of Hathor, the Bull Apis—all were praised as the living counterpart chosen by the god to represent himself. And just as in Roman Catholic churches, at certain times, a bell was formerly rung to frighten away the Devil, so in the Egyptian time the sistrum-bearer was prominent at sacred festivals; for it was his duty, by shaking the sistrum, not to frighten the evil one, but to call the attention of the deity specially to his worshippers. This accounts for the frequent appeal in the liturgies—"Behold the excellent sistrum-bearer!"

What will most impress one in these liturgies, however, is the deep, sincere religious feeling that permeates them—the grief for the lost one, the hope of again beholding him, the cry from the heart for help, the reliance upon the divine all-ruling destiny that shall bring the trial to a happy ending, and the triumph of a desire realized and a hope fulfilled: these sentiments, as much a part of human nature now as then, bring the far-off dwellers of the land of Kem near at heart and feeling to the twentieth-century reader of our own era. For above all nations of old, the future life entered especially into the Egyptian daily life and thought; their religion was one where the present was considered only the threshold; and it was their belief in the absolute endlessness of matter and the immortality of the spirit that causes the frequent

formula after many of their names—"Ankh zetta heh"—living for ever, eternal.

The two papyri in which these chants are found were both discovered in Luxor, Egypt ; and that relating particularly to Osiris is written in a hand representing an intermediate stage between hieratic and demotic. The chants of Isis were found inside a statue of Osiris, by M. Passalacqua.

The period when these chants were first written is unknown. Probably in the earliest times, they were committed to memory, and handed down verbally from generation to generation, as were so many traditions of olden time.

We may believe, however, that they had already been reduced to writing by the time of the fourth dynasty, though at that time they probably consisted chiefly of the invocatory portions, the subsidiary matter being added later, and at different periods.

The date of the texts from which the present translations are made approximates 300 B.C., while the texts themselves are written in a purer and more classic style than are most of the writings of that time ; so that it is probable that in their present form they certainly are not later than the twenty-sixth dynasty, and may probably be as early as the eighteenth or nineteenth.

The Osiris chant, together with one of the

Isis and Nephthys liturgies, exists in the hieratic form in what is known as the "Rhind papyrus," B.M. 10188, while the other Isis liturgy is in the Berlin papyrus 1425. Extracts have been published by Pleyte, in "*Recueil des Travaux*," Vol. III., and by Dr. E. A. Wallis Budge in Vol. LII. of "*Archaeologia*," many years ago. De Horrack published the second Isis liturgy in French, a translation of which into English appeared in "*Records of the Past*," Vol. II. The three chants, however, have not heretofore been published in one volume.

From the frequent mention of the sistrum-bearer in the chants, we know that this musical instrument was chiefly employed, but the music in which they were written is unknown. The Egyptians rated music highly, and Plato considered their music superior to the Greek, both for melody and energy. But harmony and rhythm were always subordinated to the words, and the subject-matter was paramount. There were two sorts of harmonies known to the old Egyptians, which the Greeks designated as "Dorian" and "Phrygian"—the former grave, slow and tranquil, the latter a dithyrambic form, probably employed in these chants, which was forceful, appealing and energetic.

The Egyptians based their music on seven diatonics, which Demetrius of Phalerus attributes to "the seven vowels"; others say the seven

senses, or the seven planets. Dion Cassius corroborates him, while Dionysos of Halicarnassus says, "Melody embraced an interval of five—it never rose more than three and one-half tones toward high, and fell less toward bass." This probably was a result of the use of the three-stringed lyre.

To find a probable origin for the legend of Osiris and Isis, it may seem strange to have to turn to the shores of Mexico and Central America ; yet there, among the ruined cities of the ancient Mayan civilization, according to Le Plongeon, are two temples bearing historical inscriptions which in many details correspond with the Egyptian legend. The king, ruling well and wisely, is slain and dismembered by his brother, and the sister-wife, after finding the body, erected over it a pyramid and sphinx, the latter with a human head on a leopard's body ; after which she travelled eastward, to the colonies of her race that had settled there centuries before ; where she lived until her death. Her son ultimately killed his usurping uncle, and ruled the Mayans in his stead. The points of resemblance between the two legends are too numerous to name here ; but as the period when the Mayan events took place is about ten thousand years before Christ, if the legends arose from one common source it would give ample time for history to become merged into myth.

Whatever be the origin of the Osiris belief, however, it is certain that in the beginning he did not typify any of the forces of nature, as some would have us believe : this is a theory of much later date than the belief upon which it is grafted, and belongs to a period of decline ; and Osiris is rather to be regarded as one of the great rulers of old time, far-seeing, advanced in his ideas, who fell a martyr to his duty, his conscience and his people. Had the Pharaohs tried rather to emulate the living Osiris, instead of simply being merged into him after death, Egypt might have survived for many centuries the cataclysms which eventually overwhelmed her, and put an end to her existence as a nation.

INVOCATION concerning the glorious things done by the two goddesses of the temple of Osiris, Khent-Amentit,¹ the great God of Abydos; performed in the 4th summer month, 25th day; likewise to be performed in every shrine of Osiris at every one of his Heb-festivals.²

Glorify his soul ! Establish his dead body !
Praise his spirit ! Give breath to his nostrils and
to his parched throat !
Give gladness unto the heart of Isis and to that
of Nephthys ;
Place Horus upon the throne of his Father ;
Give life, stability and power to Osiris Thentirti,³
Born of the great forsaken one, she who is called
also Pelses, the truthful—
Glorious are her acts, according to the words of
the gods.

Behold now, Isis speaketh,—

Come to thy temple, come to thy temple, oh An !¹

Come to thy temple, for thine enemies are not !

Behold the excellent sistrum-bearer—come to thy temple !

Lo I, thy sister, love thee—do not thou depart from me !

Behold Hunnu,² the beautiful one !

Come to thy temple immediately—come to thy temple immediately ! Behold thou my heart, which grieveth for thee ;

Behold me seeking for thee—I am searching for thee to behold thee !

Lo, I am prevented from beholding thee—

I am prevented from beholding thee, oh An !¹

It is blessed to behold thee—come to the one who loveth thee !

Come to the one who loveth thee, oh thou who art beautiful, Un-Nofer,³ deceased.

Come to thy sister—come to thy wife—

Come to thy wife, oh thou who makest the heart to rest.

I, thy sister, born of thy mother, go about to every temple of thine,

Yet thou comest not forth to me :

Gods, and men before the face of the gods, are weeping for thee at the same time, when they behold me !

Lo, I invoke thee with wailing that reacheth high
as heaven,—

Yet thou hearest not my voice. Lo I, thy sister,

sister !

Behold now, Nephthys speaketh,—

Behold the excellent sistrum-bearer ! Come to
thy temple !

Cause thy heart to rejoice, for thy enemies are not !
All thy sister-goddesses are at thy side and be-
hind thy couch,

Calling upon thee with weeping—yet thou art
prostrate upon thy bed !

Hearken unto the beautiful words uttered by us
and by every noble one among us !

Subdue thou every sorrow which is in the hearts
of us thy sisters,

Oh thou strong one among the gods,—strong
among men who behold thee !

We come before thee, oh prince, our lord ;

Live before us, desiring to behold thee ;

Turn not thou away thy face before us ;

Sweeten our hearts when we behold thee, oh
prince !

Beautify our hearts when we behold thee !

I, Nephthys, thy sister, I love thee :

Thy foes are subdued, there is not one remaining.
Lo, I am with thee ; I shall protect thy limbs for
ever, eternally.

Behold now, Isis speaketh,—
Praised be 'An¹ ; thou shinest upon us from
heaven every day,
Yet can we not behold thy beams.
Tehuti² protecteth thee ; he causeth thy soul to
be established within the Maadet boat,³ by
the power of thy name of "Iah" !
Come to me ; for I would behold thee and thy
beauties by means of the Uazit eye,—⁴
By the power of thy name of "Lord of the six
festivals" !
Thy royal attendants are by thy side, nor go they
forth from thee ;
Thou takest possession of heaven by the great-
ness of thy terrors, and by the power of thy
name of "Prince of the fifteen festivals" !
Thou shinest upon us like Ra, the lord—
Glow thou above us like Tum.
Gods and men live when beholding thee—shine
thou upon us ;
Brighten thou the two lands ;⁵
The two horizons are fitted for thy pathways.

likewise to live.

Praise be to the Lord, for there is no god like unto
thee, oh Tum ! ²

Thy soul possesseth the earth, and thy likenesses
the underworld ;

Lo, it is prepared for and containeth thy hidden shrine.

Thy wife is ready to protect thee, and thy son Horus also, as prince of the lands.

Behold the bull, the begotten one !

Come thou to Anep (Mendes), the beloved enclosure !

Come to Khar ! Come to the two Deddus (Mendes and Busiris), the place which thy soul loveth, and the souls of thy fathers likewise !

Thy son, thy child Horus, born of thy sister-goddesses, is before thy face.

It is I who doth illuminate and protect thee every day—

I will not depart from thee for ever !

Oh, An, come thou to Sais, for thy name is “ Sau ” (protector) ! ²

Come to Aper ! Behold thou thy mother, Nut, oh thou lovely child !

Depart thou not from her ! Come to her breasts; abundance is therein !

Thy sister, too, is beautiful, depart thou not from her, oh son !

Come to Sais, oh Osiris, and to Tarud,
She who is called also Nisep, born of Pelses,
deceased !

Come to Aper, thy city, thy seat, and to the
temple of Deb !

Thou shalt rest beside thy mother eternally ;
She preserveth thy limbs and procureth terror
among thy enemies, for she protecteth thy
members for ever.

Behold the excellent sistrum-bearer ! Come to
thy temple !

Come, behold thou thy son Horus as prince of gods
and men ;

He taketh possession of the cities and the nomes
by the magnitude of his terrors ;

Heaven and earth are filled with fear of him,
And the barbarians are submissive under his
terrors. Thy children are among gods and
men,

And the eastern and western horizons are among
the attributes of thy producing ;

Thy two sisters are at thy side, purifying thy
soul,

And thy son Horus admitteth thine attributes.
There cometh forth funereal and other offer-
ings—beer, bulls and geese—for thee :

Tehuti proclaimeth thy Heb-festival, and in-
voketh thee with his protecting formulae ;

Horus covereth thy limbs with his protections ;
Every day thy son Horus glorifieth thy spirit,

And he avengeth thy name by offerings for thy
soul placed at thy secret shrine.

As for the gods, their arms bear libation vases for
the purifying of thy spirit.

Come to thy children, oh prince, our lord, nor
depart thou from them.

Lo ! he comes !

THE CHANTS

(B.M. PAP. 10188)

BEGINNING in front of the temples, during the Heb-festivals of Isis and Nephthys, and performed before the shrine of Osiris, Khent-Amentit,¹ the great God, lord of Abydos, in the 4th month of Inundation, on the 22nd day and continued to the 26th day. Purify all that which appertains to the temple ; bring forth the utensils of the priestesses, who have performed the ablutions, their arms not being bared, their hair flowing over their shoulders and their heads crowned with woollen scarves ; a musical instrument in their arms, and their names inscribed upon their shoulders, dedicated to the service of Isis and Nephthys. Let them utter praises in the temples according to this writing, before this God. Let them say,—

Behold the lord Osiris ! (Repeat four times the formula.)

Is not his Kher-Heb priest ¹ held in awe in this temple—great in heaven and great on earth ?
(Repeat four times the formula.)

Are not the two impersonators of the goddesses, and Hunnu,² the beautiful, approaching to thy shrine at this moment ? (Repeat twice.)

Do we not behold the excellent sistrum-bearer approaching to thy temple and drawing nigh, though thou hast departed from us ?

Lo, Hunnu,² the beautiful, passeth over the land hourly and yearly, at his proper season ;

He, the purified image of his father Tenen,³ the essence of deep mysteries :

He proceedeth from Tum, the most excellent lord :

Perfect is he, like his father, the eldest god born of the body of his mother !

Come thou to us with thy attributes :

Let those among us who travel not thy path be embraced by thee :

Beautiful of face and greatly beloved is the image of Tenen,³ male lord of love, adored when he exhibiteth himself.

His limbs fail from his being bound ;—

Come thou in peace, oh thou lord of those among us who behold the two goddesses united !

Afflictions and evils exist not for thy members,
for they are not of thy creation.

Oh thou, our chief, turn again thy face toward
us,—thou mighty one, great one among the
gods !

The path that is visible to thee is one that cannot
be described, oh thou child Hunnu,

For it doth remain, though thou goest forth
through heaven and earth with thy attributes !

Lo, thou art as the Bull of the two goddesses—
come thou, child growing in peace, our lord !

Behold us ! Thy essence existeth with us like as
the essence of Tebha ¹ existeth in the place
of his destruction.

Come thou in peace, oh great child of his father
Mentu !

Within thy temple fear thou not :

Thy son Horus avengeth thee, and he woundeth
and carrieth away him who lurked in his
den,

He whose name a daily flame destroyeth from
among the gods—Tebha ¹ perisheth as waste
matter.

As for thee, thou hast thy temple ;

Therein fear thou not Set, nor every calamity
done by him or brought about by him.

Nut ² proceedeth forth, and embraceth thee with
joyfulness ;

Travel thou through the land among us, odorous
at thy coming forth.

Rebels behold us gazing upon thy face, glowing
in its marvellousness.

Behold ! our lord is upon our left hand, and be-
hold the beautiful face of the beloved lord
turned toward us !

Lo ! the Bull, begotten of the two cows Isis and
Nephthys !

Lo ! there cometh the bearer of the bronze-
coloured sistrum, as the praises increase ;

Beautiful when he beholdeth him, the lord, among
the seated ones,—

He, the progeny of the two cows Isis and
Nephthys, the child surpassingly beautiful !

He appeareth unto us in thy image, like the one
beloved.

Behold thou me, thy sister Isis, loved of thy
heart, loved by thy body ;

Loved art thou, because of the inundation of the
land this day.

Travel thou among us, oh thou praised one,—

Raise us living in place of what thou hast made
empty.

Come thou in peace, oh our lord, whom we be-
hold ; our prince !

Approach in peace ; drive away tempest from
before our temple ;

Send thy protection over us like a male protector !
(Repeat.)

Lo ! the two goddesses ! Behold Osiris, bull of Amentit, who is alone established !

Very great is he among the gods ; the virile infant, the great heir of Sab,¹ born the image of the God of Gods !

Come thou to the two widowed goddesses !

There goeth about thee the whole circle of the gods, and they meet with thee !

Behold, Set ² cometh—grievous is his name when uttered near thy shrine, in presence of thy father, oh Ra ;—

He is cast forth to contend with opponents !

Come surely to thy priests, striving and grieving before thy temple ;

Come surely to thy priests, in none other than thine own image !

Our lord sitteth down in his temple in peace alone ; the great conqueror is his name.

After his long suffering he resteth, taking dangerous council against his enemies ;

He smiteth the land in his designs.

Go forth, great one with the gods ;

And with thee the circle of the gods in front, with the instrument-for-opening-the-mouth,³ that it may equal thy perfection before the gods.

Walk through the land entirely, great one which art a body, with the royal Uraeus upon his forehead.

He is carried within his heart ;
At his coming, the whole speech of the god loved
alone is found ; his soul is exceedingly be-
loved.

Live thou in repeated union with the two god-
desses ;

Thy arms shall attain their desire now as
formerly ;

Thou hast proclaimed thyself under thy signet
as a king of the circle of the gods—the
lord !

Thy priests surely come ; thy father Ra smiteth
that which hath evil designs.

The circle of the gods surroundeth thy pathway,
and they meet with thee :

Destroy thou the evil ones and the great calamity
which has fallen upon the two counterparts,
Isis and Nephthys :

Thy house is holding festival for the calamity (of
evil-doers).

His enemies are cut off by disaster from him,
when they behold him :

He overfloweth the land as is his custom.

He hath driven away disaster from Nut ; the sur-
face of the earth hath he laid bare, and
carried it away in his chariot :

He hath carried away and smitten the enemies of
thy father, oh Ra, to justify himself. Thy
son Horus is fettered so that he may not
answer to thee :

Traverse thou the land in thy manifestations,
stride thou like Nut over the four quarters
of the world !

Thou passest over the land, above the godly
temples of the two goddesses, Isis and
Nephthys :

At thy proceeding thou art exalted twice
over.

Behold, Set in his chariot—thy enemies are not
his enemies !

Come thou into thy temple, oh Osiris, and seek
for thy place ;

Behold thou, and hearken to the speech of Horus,
lying in the arms of his mother, Isis :

Overcome thou indeed in the two lands, oh
lord !

Carry out thy word, preserve it in the temple,
inscribe thou it, oh great God ;

Restrain with thy manifestations, in thy going
forth from thy temple, oh Osiris !

Come thou in peace to thy seat, oh lord, Con-
queror !

Show us the great Bull, the lovable lord, as he
shall become !

Thy duck, thy sister, Isis, produceth the sweet
odours belonging to thee and with thee,

Yet thy way doth not tend toward us, oh our
lord !

Give thou life from the beginning unto be-
lievers !

Hail ! Guard thou the inundation in the land of Tesdu,¹ like as thou hast never done before !

Thy sister cometh to thee ; she openeth for thee her arms, oh great god, living, great, beloved !

She dandleth thy son in front of thee, at the head of the south and the north !

The lord of ornamentation, the great male one in the heaven of the gods, is decorated !

Thou camest from thy mother, Nut ; she spread herself out before thee at thy coming forth from her ;

She protected thy limbs from all evil ; she followed thee as her babe.

She drove away every danger from thy limbs, chiefly that which was harmful to thee, thou child, the lord.

He goeth forth from Nut ; he gazeth upon this land as its head, he the only lord, the child !

Thou goest forth from this cow which conceiveth from the gods, oh thou opener of the underworld in its time !

Lo ! the child followeth ; thy father Ra remains not ;

Thy son Horus shall take vengeance for thee upon the enemy for every calamity brought about by him.

Come thou to thy temple, and fear thou not !
Come thou to thy temple, and fear thou not !
Behold the two impersonators of the goddesses !
 behold the excellent sistrum-bearers !
Approach to thy temple ! Be thou exalted twice
 over in thy temple !
Lo, the gods are in their places ! I am the glorious
 sister of her elder brother !
Thy wife, the elder of thy mother !
Come thou to me, running after my heart, which
 would look upon thee ;
Thy back hath never been beheld by me—make
 clear the way to us, before me.
Behold Ra in heaven ! Protect, oh Nut, the
 land !
Make a shadow in the land as doth Ra : inflame
 the heart, that thou mayest escape evil :
Inflame the heart, to cause thee to come after
 me !
Lo ! thou canst not prevent it from turning me
 toward thee.
Firm are the dwellings of Osiris returning on his
 paths !
I am seeking after love : behold me existing in
 the city, great are its walls :

Hidden am I among the plants, and concealed is
thy son that he cannot answer to thee, while

Behold this male child ! Lo, I know, I and the
Opener-of-Ways, Osiris.

I go about thy ways, I turn back towards my
elder brother, escaping from danger.

I inflame the hearts of hundreds of thousands,
and ponder greatly upon the gods.

Behold us, oh lord ! let thy love not lack before
our faces, thou male one, sweet lord, ruler of
Egypt, lord eternal !

Fly thou with life, prince everlasting ; destroy
the ones who know not the goddess, thou
ruler of Upper and Lower Egypt, the lord !

Command over Deseret : ¹—there thou remainest
not,

For full of me is the heart which existeth in him,
the elder, the lord !

Command over the Nome of Iqertet ! ²

Come to me with thy attributes ! Come in
peace !

Come in peace, oh ruler of Upper and Lower
Egypt, thou prince !

Come in peace because of our love for thee—come
like the breath, like my love at beholding
thee !

My arms are raised for thy protection ; love thou
me !

Love thou me in the two orbits of the Realms of
Osiris, full of my pondering about thee !

There thou dost receive a fillet for the hair among
them who dwell therein ;

Breezes blow for thee with perfume, oh husband,
elder, lord beloved !

Come thou in peace to thy temple—lo, the ex-
cellent sistrum-bearer approacheth to thy
house, with his instrument of music on his
arm. (Repeat twice.)

Thou dost take from thy shrine thy possessions
as the male one of Amentit, the place of thy
shrine ;

Thy body is before the temple of Henu. Hail !
in thy name of prince everlasting !

Horus cometh to thee in strength ;

He removeth thy limbs and he collecteth thine
emanations and that which goeth forth from
thee :

The great god approacheth at thy word, and is
restrained by thy attributes.

Come thou in peace, oh our lord, the child, for
continually thy son Horus doth avenge
thee.

Come before thy temple—grant abundance to thy

holy temple which thou lovest, oh prince,
leader, strong one !

Break open before us as the only Egg, oh strong
one, valorous son !

Lo, this one is the opener-of-the-body, the master-
ful one—the god Seb is before his mother.

Great are my adornings, for that done in Amentit
is beloved :

He hath vanquished disaster, he is lord of the
dead, the Bull of Amentit, born of Horus-
Ra of the two horizons, the child lovely to
the one beholding him.

Come thou to us in peace twice renewed—remove
thou thy penalties ;

Drive away the evil moment, oh our lord !

Come thou to us in peace twice renewed ! Praise
the child !

The elder cometh in peace, rejoicing, and there
cometh the looked-for ruler of Egypt, the
prince eternal, as “ Still Heart.”¹

As “ Still Heart ” is thy heart, oh our lord ;
come thou to thy temple—fear thou not the
great evils.

Dost thou not behold and hear the words uttered
at thy Heb-festival ?

Behold, the excellent sistrum-bearer !

There cometh to thy temple the circle of the gods,
seeking to see thee, oh child, lord, first maker
of the body.

The babe whom thou lovest is before thy face,
the heir overcoming at the beginning, the
excellent son.

There proceedeth from the temple, visibly and
audibly, the grieving of Isis concerning thee,
upon the path to thy place.

Grant deliverance before those whom thou lovest ;
They weep for thee with hair unbound,—before
Un-Nofer, the lord of bounty, the prince great
in his terror, the god above the heavens !

The gods produce the inundation for thee—be-
gotten is it by thee daily.

Lo ! the divine essence of the gods is spread upon
his limbs :

Behold ! he causeth to live those of the older time
and human beings since,—he the lord of
bounty, prince making fertile,

Great lord, plant giving life, granting twice over
the peace of the gods !

There are funeral offerings for the souls of the
deceased, and for Seshta,¹ the lord of the
funeral couch, the lord of the sacred eye, in
the holy horizon of the temple.

He shineth at his season, and is brilliant in his
hour,—

Thou art Khu, who art accompanied by radiances.
Shine thou at the left hand of Tum—

Behold, thou art upon the seat of Ra, revealing
his brilliances.

Thy mummy fieth with thy soul toward Ra.

Thou illuminest at the daybreak, and thou
retest at evening, this being thy daily
work ;

For thou art at the left hand of Tum the ever-
lasting, eternal. Thou risest, and hateful
wickedness is restrained even before it is
conceived, before its calamity cometh upon
thee.

He turneth back the attack of foes that come
fiercely against him.

The god Imsehti,¹ he is thy heir ;

Cause thou every one of the gods to praise him.

Exalt the circle of the gods by thy victory ;
occupy thyself with Ra every day.

Behold thou the image on thy left hand—behold
thou the image of living beings, for thou art
Tum, the forerunner of Ra.

There cometh to thee the entire circle of the gods
above thy head, invoking joy upon thy
head, and falling flame upon thine enemies.

There is praise to thee from us, that thy flesh may
embrace again thy bones ; thy word is de-
creed every day.

Approach thou like Tum in his season, turning
not : thy sinews are strong in thee, oh thou
Opener-of-Ways !

He bringeth thee to the mountains, he heweth
the place of burial ;

There belongeth to thee all Ta-Deseret.¹

For thee are the two, Isis and Nephthys—do
thou strengthen us, for they ponder on thy
image.

Thy limbs are as mutilated unto thee ; they seek
to bind together thy dead body.

No calamity cometh to them when approaching
to thee with hair unbound !

Come thou to us entirely, for thou rememberest :
Thou comest with thy attributes before the land ;
modify thy power.

For thy peace is proclaimed to us, oh lord, heir
of the two thrones, god alone excellent,
designed of the gods : every god adoreth
thee !

Thou comest ; it is thy temple ; fear not, be-
loved of Ra, beloved of thy two images ;

Be peaceful in thy temple ; thy words are
eternal !

Lo ! the two representatives of the goddesses !
Lo ! the excellent sistrum-bearer !

Come to thy temple—he rejoiceth twice over
in thy temple because of thee, oh child,
like one beloved !

Behold thou ! Come, come to us : great is thy
protection, thou whom we love : come thou
to thy temple, nor fear thou.

Behold the gods existing in heaven ! Behold
the gods existing on earth !

Behold the gods existing in the Place of the Dead ! Behold the gods existing in the expanse of the universe !

Come after us who are under thy lady, every one beloved by thee, the eldest-born, lord of love ; to him be praise !

Come to me, thou uniter of heaven to earth, who causeth his shadow daily in the land, messenger of heaven to earth !

Hail ! Approach thou to us with me, eldest-born wife, in the city !

Seek for our lord—traverse the land toward our lord !

Come to me, thou messenger of heaven, who changeth things :

Cause the god to come to his house, breathing again with the breath of thy nostrils !

Behold ! the breath from the lord is in his great temple !

Praise Ra, the avenger ; he doth not oppose that which is thine ; but he hath produced calamity after the desire of thy heart !

Behold thou, rejoicing king, beautiful child !
Hail, oh lord beloved !

Come to me, oh lord ; thou who art beheld daily, thou elder one !

Come, behold us ; great are thy two arms ! Lo !
thine avenger ! The two arms lift thee up twice over !

They are thy protection, male, lord, child, babe !

It is the avenger, our lord—lo, I am son of
Seb !

Depart not from me in thy time—lo ! it is not
ever his time !

I follow after thy ways, after thy going thence,
lord beloved of me,

Thou who hoverest over the lands, nor retest in
thy passage :

I am inflamed with loving thee ! Hail ! Ap-
proach !

Behold, I weep for thee alone ; come to me
who runneth because of my desire to behold
thee ;

While I am behind thee I desire to behold thy
face !

Hail, thou who art invoked in thy temple, being
protected twice over in peace !

Hail to thee twice over ! Our lord cometh to
his temple ; our arms shall protect him
behind his temple.

Our lord cometh in peace to his place : when
thou art established in thy temple, fear
thou not !

Lo ! praised twice over is our lord, with acclama-
tion, because God is great.

Come thou in peace and truth ; go thou forth
under Ra, masterful among the gods, ap-
proved one !

Come in peace, thou looked-for child !

Come thou with thy attributes as a child :

the evil one has fallen ; Horus is as a prince.

He is great toward thee ; he is not exalted above thee in his circuit.

Lo, the two goddesses, the ones loving the father, lord of rejoicings !

The hearts of the circle of the gods of the region of Fayûm rejoice for thee ;

Thy holy temple holdeth thy beauties ; the circle of the gods is filled with awe at thy terrible-ness and the land trembleth at thy terror.

I am thy wife, made as thou art, the elder sister, soul of her brother.

He cometh and is visible, the lord beloved, praised twice over, the great Egg.

He cometh and is visible, the babe ; the child advanceth, he cometh and is visible.

The extent of the earth weepeth for thee ; the regions lament for thee, Seshta ;¹

Heaven and earth weep for thee, for great art thou among the gods.

There are not a few who adore thy soul—come to thy temple, nor fear thou.

Thy son Horus embraceth the circuit of heaven ; Bebi² prevaieth ; fear thou not.

Thy son Horus taketh vengeance before thee ; he overthroweth for thee the evil ones and plotters.

Hail, oh lord, whose increase in brightness is daily beheld ; the odour of thy limbs is like odours of Punt.

Praised are those who are dead and at peace ; and the entire circle of the gods rejoiceth.

Come thou to thy wife in peace ; her heart fluttereth for thy love ; she is not embraced since thy going from her.

Her heart shall delight to behold thee—thy beauties go forth of thee to her in thy shrine.

She removeth from thy limbs calamity and evil, such as hath never happened unto thee formerly.

Come thou to life in front of thy wife ! Hail ! Guard thou the inundation in the fields of Aphroditopolis this day—grant grain twice over—let there be no likeness of evil.

The Cow¹ weepeth for thee with her voice ; thou art beloved in her heart ; her heart fluttereth, enchanted for thee ;

She embraceth thy limbs with her two arms, and cometh running steadily toward thee, for peace.

Behold, her vengeance is accomplished for thee ; she is caused to be mighty by thee ;

Thy flesh hath she bound with thy bones for thee ; she hath gathered for thee thy breath in front of thee, and made thy bones entire.

Thy mother Nut cometh to thee in peace, she
hath built up life from her own body ;

The renewed soul is made doubly steadfast—

for lo ! they are not over his child to protect
him.

Thy hair is like turquoise over his body, at thy
coming into the cultivated fields :

With turquoise is thy hair twined and with lapis
lazuli, the finest of lapis lazuli :

Lo ! the lapis lazuli is above thy hair : thy skin
and thy flesh are like iron of the south ;
thy bones are formed of silver.

I am as a child : thy teeth are to thee as fine
lapis lazuli :

Sweet-scented odours are upon thy hair, with
unguents that proceed from himself.

Chiefs are before thee as lapis lazuli. Sab lifts

up himself with offerings unto thee, causing
him, the great God, to approach,
He, who goeth forth in front of the great heir,
who goeth forth from Ra, the eldest one,
beautiful prince, of god-like face, the living
soul of Istennu (Thoth)—
The child, proceeding from the God of seeing
and hearing, the eldest one, prince of eastern
and western horizons, heir of Sab.
He giveth to thee every circuit of the Sun God
Aten—come to thy temple, oh Osiris,
Opener-of-Ways to the Gods :
Thou openest thy two eyes and thou dost behold
among them.
Remove thou storms of rain and give thou
sunshine to the land, with fecundity during
the night-time.
Come to thy temple, oh Osiris Khent-Amentit ;
come to thy temple !
Come with the body of the Uraeus on thy head :
his two eyes shine over the two regions of
the gods ;
Exalted twice over is the prince, our lord.
Thy foes are destined for slaughter, since they
are not steadfast at all because of thy
name.
Make firm thy limbs for thee, oh Un-Nofer—life;
stability and health ;
For thy flesh causeth the heart to rest, oh Osiris,
beautiful.

Lo, there goeth forth with thee, and in front of thee, this god Hu,¹ and Tatenen, thy father, who supporteth heaven ; and thou art the fourth god who progresseth therein.

Thy soul flyeth to the east, because thou art as the image of Ra.

Those existing in the realms of the dead are accepted with rejoicing :

Sab, who existeth therein, openeth unto thee.

They come to thee with an offering, and travel to thee with an offering from Deddu.²

Osiris is exalted before thee—he is exalted twice over in peace.

There cometh unto thee Isis, lady of the horizon, who hath begotten herself alone in the image of the gods.

It is she who is avenged before thee—it is she who is avenged before thee !

She hath taken vengeance before Horus, the woman who was made a male by her father Osiris.

Go forth and behold the “ Opener-of-Ways,”³ the revered, the Uraeus-wearer !

Come forth as Ra ; come forth as the pupil of the eye that beholdeth Tum, when Ra shineth as chief twice over !

Behold ! He cometh !

Writings of the 12th year, 4th month of summer, in the day of the Pharaoh (life, stability and health) Alexander,³ son of Alexander, prince of the god and father;—he being also priest of Amen-Ra, king of the Gods, priest of Horus the Ra, the great child, supreme, first-born of Amen; priest of the Amen-of-the-two-Horns, priest of Khensu in the midst of Bennit,⁴ priest of Osiris-of-the-great-persea-trees, priest of Osiris-in-the-midst-of-Ishrel, priest of Amen-ha-set-in-the-midst-of-Ipui, Uab-priest of the Ra in the chief temple of the temples of Amen, over the Sa-priests of second rank; recorder of the treasury of the God Amen, over the Sa-priests of second rank; deputy of Amen, of the Sa-priests of second and fourth rank; priest of Nofer-Hotep, the great God; priest of Nofer-Hotep the child, priest of Osiris, Horus, Isis and Nephthys, priest of the temple of Het,¹ priest

“Send the purified ‘Abd’-fish from before the
boat of Ra, oh lord of the beginning,

She cutteth off the heads of the enemies in this her name of “Lady of Tepka.”

Oh, lady of the beginning, come thou before our faces in this her name of Hathor, lady of emerald, lady of Uast the holy !

Come thou in peace, because of this her name of Hathor, lady of Uast the holy !

Come thou in peace, oh Tayt, in this her name of lady of peace !

Come thou in front, to overthrow her enemy, in this her name of Hathor, lady of the temple of Suten-Henen, the golden !

Come thou in peace, in this her name of Hathor, lady of Inbut !

Come thou in peace beside Neb-er-zer in this name of Hathor, lady of Shet-Tekh !

Shine, oh golden one, beside her father in this her name of Bast.

Go forward over the temples and by the side of the great temple, in this her name of Satet.

The two lands become fertile,—regulate thou the gods in this her name of Mazit.

Hathor overpowereth the enemy of her father by this her name of Sekhet !

Mazit overpowereth exceedingly in this her name of lady of Immu.

She placeth perfume upon her head and her hair,
in this her name of Neit.

Extol him before the gods, and before his witnesses !

Hathor is the lady of Uast : Hathor is the lady
of Suten-Henen :

Hathor is the lady of Tepka : Hathor is the lady
of Mehut :

Hathor is the lady of Rehesau : Hathor is the
lady of Shet-Desret :

Hathor is the lady of the Turquoise : Hathor is
the lady of Ineb :

Hathor is the lady of Uahwah : Hathor is the
lady of Ammu :

Hathor is the lady of Imem : Hathor is as Hennu
of Met-Sas !

The nine companions¹ approach—let your arms
be beneath your father Osiris—protect the
land. (Repeat four times.)

Hail, thou crowned lord of the feast ! (Repeat
twice.)

Oh prince ! hail ! it is sweet for the courtesans
whom thou lovest !

Hail, thou who livest twice over throughout
eternity !

Hail !—thou keepest festival for ever !

Hail, adored one : thou advancest along the ways !

Hail, thou who art established in the regions
above the heavens !

Behold, there are rebellious hearts, hating the temple, but the end of all things strikes them upon their necks!

Lo ! the coming of the lord of Deddu-above-the heavens—he strikes down rebellious hearts !
(Repeat the words sixteen times to the accompaniment of musical instruments.)

It is finished.
